Since all members of Council have been provided with a copy of the minutes of the Regular Meeting of July 19, 2011, the Special Meeting of July 30, 2011 and the Work Session Meeting of August 2, 2011 if there are no additions or corrections, I move we dispense with the reading of the minutes and that they be approved.

Vote 6 Councilmembers AYE REPORTS OF COMMITTEES AND OFFICERS

PUBLIC SAFETY – Councilmember Cope asked Police Chief Reynolds to give the monthly report. Chief Reynolds provided the statistical report for the month of July and Year-to-Date as follows: 69 moving violations - 353 YTD; 301 parking violations - 457 YTD; 21 accidents handled – 42 YTD; 5 suspicious vehicles – 33 YTD; and 390 motor vehicle stops – 1660 YTD; 50 Ordinance violations – 102 YTD; 32 adult arrests – 105 YTD; 5 driving while intoxicated – 26 YTD; 25 juvenile arrests – 54 YTD; 48 medical emergencies – 124 YTD; 22 fire calls – 68 YTD; 5 alarms – 51 YTD; 17 open doors/windows – 267 YTD; 13 noise complaints – 39 YTD; 40 animal control complaints – 142 YTD; and 1841 incidents logged – 7761 YTD. Councilmember Cope asked Fire Chief Stanford to provide his monthly report. Chief Stanford outlined his statistical report for the month of July as follows: 1017 rental and business inspections YTD; 17 life hazard inspections; 45 smoke detector inspections; 13 life hazard inspections; 15 smoke detector inspections; 12 permits; and 289 re-inspections. Chief Stanford reported the Fire Co. had 31 fire calls, 6 work details, 868 total man hours, 7 mutual aids, and 54 EMS calls. Councilmember Cope reported on Public Safety Committee meeting and topics discussed are as follows: the possibility of a new sound system for the Court; however, the system being considered was being utilized by other towns which had bad experiences and eventually removed the systems; approved the new Beach Vehicle Permit Application; truck parking on 96th Street and parking at the Tower Lot during the Farmers' Market; and approved new cross-walks on Second Avenue at 80th, 81st, 82nd and 83rd Streets. Councilmember Cope reported that Verizon is not supporting the current 911 system so the Committee is in the process of looking at several other options. In response to issues raised several months ago regarding the Fire Bureau, Councilmember Cope provided a detailed history, and the following are highlighted statements: "April 5, 2011 -- Council Meeting -Charles Koch - 236 85th Street -Mr. Koch inquired about the UFC employees and the salaries approved for 2011. Mr. Koch stated that Borough ordinances state that UFC employees should not be Borough employees, but members of the

Volunteer Fire Co. April 19, 2011 -- Borough Council Regular Meeting, "The Public Safety Committee has confirmed that Stone Harbor is in compliance with both the spirit and the letter of the law in its current fire prevention operations. Charles Koch – 236 85th Street – stated his opposition to Councilmember Cope's statement regarding the Fire Prevention Bureau and objected to the Borough's hiring two full-time employees to do inspections. May 13, 2011 --Letter to -- Charles J. Koch, 236 85th St., Stone Harbor, NJ 08247 - "This letter restated the Public Safety Committee's in writing." May 31, 2011 -- Letter from Brian Levinson on Mr. Koch's behalf. – "Charles Koch gave me your letter to him, dated May 13, 2011, because of my familiarity with working with statutes and regulations. I disagree with your conclusions in your letter. Not only is your logic inconsistent but also your explanations are both faulty and wrong." Levinson goes on to quote and disagree with all my statements that were contained in my May 13, 2011 letter to Mr. Koch... And closes with The Borough's action of placing the Fire Official and fire inspectors as employees of the Borough is contrary to NJ statutes and DCA regulations. Therefore, with respect to fire code enforcement, please remove the Fire Official and fire inspectors from the Borough's list of employees and cease providing them with certain costly benefits given to Borough employees. The Public Safety Committee did not respond to Mr. Levinson's letter. June 15, 2011 -- Levinson writes to Commissioner Lori Grifa, NJ Dept. of Community Affairs: I am writing to you on behalf of several Stone Harbor residents who are concerned about the failure of the Borough of Stone Harbor and the local enforcing agency (LEA) to comply with the DCA's regulations regarding which entity is to hire the fire official and fire inspectors. Levinson closes: I hope that the enclosed letters provide sufficient information to allow the Department to advise the Borough to cease employing the fire official and fire inspectors (and related personnel) and to have these people employed by the LEA. July 18, 2011 -- William E. Kramer, Jr. Acting Director, New Jersey Division of Fire Safety, responds to Levinson as follows: In your correspondence, you raised several concerns about the interaction between the Borough of Stone Harbor and the Bureau of Fire Prevention within the Stone Harbor Volunteer Fire Company No. 1. After reviewing the concerns expressed in your correspondence we cannot support your opinion that the Borough is in violation in its employing the fire official, fire inspectors and Bureau personnel. Accordingly, we have no basis upon which we can provide the recourse that you seek. In Conclusion: The position of the Public Safety Committee and the Borough Council of Stone Harbor with respect to Uniform Fire Code Official, Inspectors, and Employees has been affirmed. The opinions, contentions and statements of Charles Koch and Brian Levinson, with respect to this matter are without merit and lack any substantiation in law or fact.

NATURAL RESOURCES - Councilmember Carusi reported on the beach replenishment project and stated that the split rail fencing has been completed, a few cross-overs will be completed by Public Works, sand dune fencing will be installed shortly, dune grass plantings will done in October/November, and the sand scaping continues. Councilmember Carusi reported that names of prospective members of the Bird Sanctuary Committee have been submitted to the Mayor for appointment. Councilmember Carusi reported that the Natural Resources Committee also discussed the memorial gardens which have some dead plants that need to be replaced, due to the excessive heat; maintenance of the Sanctuary; bay residents around Sedge Island are seeking financial support from the Borough to deal with the fragmites; the pocket park will hopefully become part of the existing Stone Harbor Beach Access Plan and there appears to be support from the County and State for funding this project; the Borough's consultant provided an update on Site 103 and the current issues with this site; New Jersey Fish and Wildlife reported that there are no piping plovers at the Point, the turn colony that was present was a total failure and no nests successfully hatched this year because of flooding and the presence of a fox den. Councilmember Carusi provided the following animal control report: 16 dogs, 3 cats, 14 skunks, 6 birds and 1 possum.

BEACH & RECREATION – Councilmember Davies-Dunhour reported that the Beach tag sales are up \$21,738 with a continued increase in weekly and daily tag sales, however, seasonal tag sales is down. Councilmember Davies-Dunhour asked Lifeguard Captain, Sandy Bosacco, to give his monthly report. Captain Bosacco reported that during the month of July there were 8 rescues, 5 EMS calls, 13 lost children, 2 hobie cat assists, and 1 police assist call. Captain Bosacco reported that lifeguards will be on duty through Labor Day weekend and after Labor Day weekend, some beaches will be protected and people should contact Headquarters for information; the beach has been very crowded this summer and the guards have been performing very well. Councilmember Davies-

Dunhour reported that the bids have been sent out for the Recreation Support Building and will be opened on Wednesday, August 24, 2011 at 10:00 a.m. Recreation Director Van Cathcart reported that most of the programs are coming to an end, but basketball, baseball, t-ball, etc. will continue through this week; Rec offices will remain open through September 2, 2011; the Awards Picnic was on Friday, August 12 and was extremely well attended; entertainment at the 96th Street Park will continue through the end of August; the Marina will be open through Labor Day; and the summer camps continue. Mr. Cathcart thanked Mayor and Council for their support and thanked his staff for doing a great job. Joann DelVescio, Tourism Director, reported on tourism activities for the month of July which include coverage on press releases, preparing for photo shoots, Orr at the Shore with Kathy Orr from Channel 3 was here at the end of July and her show aired several times throughout the evening; Barbeque and Blues Festival which was not as successful as last year (possibly due to the inclement weather); updates to Channel 2; Fox 29 News was here and did their morning show from the Beach; Grace Hanlon, the State Director of the Division of Travel and Tourism will be visiting and touring Stone Harbor on Friday; Adam Joseph, the weather man from Channel 6, will be doing his show live from here; press releases are being picked up on Google; the Flag Lowering ceremony on Tuesdays is a little slow getting started but next year it will have better signage; Family Night on Mondays has been very successful; and upcoming events include the Sidewalk Sale and the Harvest Festival. Councilmember Kramar commented that she was at the beach for the Fox 29 filming and commented that Allison Mastrangelo did a wonderful job producing this segment.

<u>UTILITIES</u> - Councilmember Kramar reported that a sewer lateral at 8811 Third Avenue was replaced; a sewer manhole was repaired at 104th Street and Third Avenue; a new well controller was installed at the 101st Street well; 28 mark-outs for the month of July; and weekly water samples continue to be taken. Councilmember Kramar reported water pumped in July was 44.417 million gallons compared to 45.012 million gallons in July, 2010.

<u>PUBLIC WORKS</u> – Councilmember Mastrangelo reported that Public Works is now in the "survival mode" and trying to keep up with day-to-day operations; a total of 485.75 man hours were utilized for Special Events including the Baby Parade, Jaws Fitness Festival, Arts & Crafts Show and the Barbeque and Blues Festival. Councilmember Mastrangelo reported that all Borough landscaping and buildings are being maintained. Councilmember Mastrangelo reported that the litter patrol picked up 67 bags on trash during the month of July; and the solid waste tipping fees for July 2011 were \$26,797.12 up \$1,084.98 or 4% over July, 2010. Councilmember Mastrangelo reported that the next scheduled bulk days are Monday, September 19th and Monday, November 14th.

<u>ADMINISTRATIVE & FINANCE</u> — Councilmember Vaul reported that the A & F Committee met twice during the month of July and discussed appointing the next Borough Administrator; issues for the Planning Board relating to hotel/motel in the downtown area; and the State Health Benefits increased contributions for employees. Councilmember Vaul reported that revenues are down slightly and expenses are well within budgeted expenses. Councilmember Vaul stated that it is time to start thinking about the 2012 Budget.

ENGINEER'S REPORT - Mark DeBlasio, Borough Engineer, provided the Engineer's report as follows:

<u>Beach Outfall Elimination Project – Phase 2 & Phase 3</u> <u>Preliminary Assessment</u>

- Applications to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, NJDEP CAFRA and Waterfront Development & NJEIT have been submitted and are under review.
- Public Comment period ended June 23, 2011. No comments were received from the public regarding the application. NJDEP has accepted the Individual Permit Application as being complete for final review. The deadline for decision on the application is August 21, 2011.
- Public Hearing per NJEIT requirements was held July 15, 2011.
- NJDEP Bureau of Water Systems has issued the construction permit with a permit expiration date of July 15, 2016.

114th Street Generator Installation

<u>HEARING OF THE PUBLIC ON MEMORIALS, RESOLUTIONS, PETITIONS & COMPLAINTS</u>

Josie Rich – 10410 Sunset Drive – inquired about the Pay to Play Ordinance. Mr. Hawk stated that the Borough has been following this policy for years, however, it was never put in Ordinance form and as part of the State's Best Practices Checklist, it is required. Mr. Donohue explained that the Borough has been following this procedure for years. Mr. Donohue explained the essence of the Ordinance is that if the Borough were to follow the Fair & Open process for the rendering of professional services contract, each bidder could contribute up to \$2,600 per candidate; however, the process the Borough follows requires each contractor to sign "Business Entity Disclosure Certification" wherein the contractor certifies that he/she has not made any political contribution to a municipal candidate in excess of \$300.00. Mr. Donohue explained that the Borough follows the most restrictive process and the Ordinance does not allow "forgiveness" of previous contributions because we never accepted them.

Susan Thompson – 8201 Second Avenue – requested cross-walks or flashing speed limit signs be put up on Second Avenue near the Rec Center to deal with the dangerous traffic condition. Councilmember Cope responded that this request has already been approved by the Public Safety Committee.

Bob Ashman – 10301 First Avenue – asked for a status on the library. Mr. Donohue stated that this issue will be discussed in closed session; however an addendum to the lease is being prepared and according to the County, ground breaking should be next month.

<u>RESOLUTION 2011-S-137</u> – Moment of Remembrance on the 10th Anniversary of September 11th

Joining the National Moment of Remembrance of the 10th Anniversary of September 11th

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Borough of Stone Harbor expresses their support of the United State's Senate regarding coming together as a Nation and ceasing all work or other activity for a moment of remembrance beginning at 1:00 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time on September 11, 2011, in honor of the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks committed against the United States on September 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, at 8:46 a.m., on September 11, 2001, hijacked American Airlines Flight 11 crashed into the upper portion of the North Tower of the World Trade Center in New York City, New York; and

WHEREAS, 17 minutes later, at 9:03 a.m., hijacked United Airlines Flight 175 crashed into the South Tower of the World Trade Center; and

WHEREAS, at 9:37 a.m., the west wall of the Pentagon was hit by hijacked American Airlines Flight 77, the impact of which caused immediate and catastrophic damage to the headquarters of the Department of Defense; and

WHEREAS, at approximately 10:00 a.m., the passengers and crew of hijacked United Airlines Flight 93 acted heroically to retake control of the airplane and thwart the taking of additional American lives by crashing the airliner in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, and, in doing so, gave their lives to save countless others; and

WHEREAS, nearly 3,000 innocent civilians were killed in the heinous attacks of September 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, tens of thousands of individuals narrowly escaped the attacks at the Pentagon and World Trade Center and, as witnesses to this tragedy, are forever changed; and

- **WHEREAS,** countless fire departments, police departments, first responders, governmental officials, workers, emergency medical personnel, and volunteers responded immediately and heroically to those horrific events; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Fire Department of New York suffered 343 fatalities on September 11, 2001, the largest loss of life of any emergency response agency in United States history; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Port Authority Police Department suffered 37 fatalities in the attacks, the largest loss of life of any police force in United States history in a single day; and
- **WHEREAS**, the New York Police Department suffered 23 fatalities as a result of the terrorist attacks; and
- **WHEREAS,** the impact of that day on public health continues through 2011, as nearly 90,000 people are at risk of or suffering from negative health effects as a result of the events of September 11, 2001, including 14,000 workers and 2,400 community residents who are sick, and tens of thousands of others whose health is being monitored; and
- **WHEREAS,** 10 years later, the people of the United States and people around the world continue to mourn the tremendous loss of innocent life on that fateful day; and
- **WHEREAS**, 10 years later, thousands of men and women in the United States Armed Forces remain in harm's way defending the United States against those who seek to threaten the United States; and
- **WHEREAS,** on the 10th anniversary of this tragic day, the thoughts of the people of the United States are with all of the victims of the events of September 11, 2001 and their families; and
- **WHEREAS,** the lives of Americans were changed forever on September 11, 2001, when events threatened the American way of life; and
- **WHEREAS,** in 2009, Congress and the President joined together to designate September 11 as a National Day of Service and Remembrance under the Serve America Act (Public Law 111–13; 123 Stat. 1460); and
- **WHEREAS,** in September 2009 and 2010, President Obama issued Proclamation 8413 (74 Fed. Reg. 47045) and Proclamation 8559 (75 Fed. Reg. 56463) proclaiming September 11, 2009, and September 11, 2010, respectively, as Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance; and
- **WHEREAS,** September 11 will never, and should never, be just another day in the hearts and minds of all people of the United States;
- **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the governing body of the Borough of Stone Harbor:
- (1) recognizes September 11, 2011, as a day of solemn commemoration of the events of September 11, 2001, and a day to come together as a Nation; and
- (2) offers its deepest and most sincere condolences to the families, friends, and loved ones of the innocent victims of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks; and
- (3) honors the heroic service, actions, and sacrifices of first responders, law enforcement personnel, State and local officials, volunteers, and countless others who aided the innocent victims of those attacks and, in doing so, bravely risked and often gave their own lives; and
 - (4) recognizes the valiant service, actions, and sacrifices of United States personnel,

including members of the United States Armed Forces, the United States intelligence agencies, the United States diplomatic service, homeland security and law enforcement personnel, and their families, who have given so much, including their lives and well-being, to support the cause of freedom and defend the security of the United States; and

(5) reaffirms that the people of the United States will never forget the challenges our country endured on and since September 11, 2001, and will work tirelessly to defeat those who attacked the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on the 10th anniversary of this tragic day in United States history the governing body of the Borough of Stone Harbor calls upon all of the people and institutions of the United States to observe a moment of remembrance on September 11, 2011, including (i) media outlets; (ii) houses of worship; (iii) military organizations; (iv) veterans organizations; (v) airlines; (vi) airports; (vii) railroads; (viii) sports teams; (ix) the Federal Government; (x) State and local governments; (xi) police, fire, and other public institutions; (xii) educational institutions; (xiii) businesses; and (xiv) other public and private institutions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the governing body of Borough of Stone Harbor encourages the observance of the moment of remembrance to last for 1 minute beginning at 1:00 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time by, to the maximum extent practicable ceasing all work or other activity; and marking the moment in an appropriate manner, including by ringing bells, blowing whistles, or sounding sirens.

WHEREAS, three (3) bids were received by the Stone Harbor Municipal Clerk on July 7, 2011 for Painting & Metal Repair – Public Works Building – Phase III under the specifications prepared by the Borough Engineers bearing Project No. 05-10-U-043, which specifications are hereby incorporated herein by reference, all in accordance with the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 *et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council has reviewed the recommendations made by the Borough Engineer and the Borough Solicitor on said bids; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has determined that sufficient funds are available as evidenced by the Chief Financial Officer's Certification attached hereto; and
