PUBLIC COMMENT

No one from the public commented.

OLD BUSINESS:

Glen Ortman, Borough Auditor explained about the increase this year. The budget for 2012 totals 13.4 million dollars compared to last year's 12.9 million dollars. The tax levy in the 2012 budget is up \$635,958 which equates to a tax rate increase of 1.3 cents per \$100 assessed value. The main driver of the budget is debt service increase from 2011. We had a bond sale in October 2011 for \$12,750,000 to cover Capital Projects that have been ongoing from 2006. The increase in debt service in 2012 equates to \$767,000. The tax levy is up only 635,000 compared to a debt service increase of \$767,000, so we decrease operations in other areas of the budget to bring it down to 1.3 cents. Originally when we projected the bond sale last year it was 1.5 to 1.6 cents of an impact due to debt service.

WHEREAS, public awareness and interest to visit the Stone Harbor National Natural Landmark would be enhanced by the addition of a wayside sign on an existing Coastal Heritage Trail sign

standard showing the exit to The Wetlands Institute by the side of the northbound lanes of the Garden State Parkway just south of the Stone Harbor Boulevard intersection; and

WHEREAS, sufficient time exists to erect such a wayside sign prior to the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Landmark program and for any attendant recognition of the Program and the site by National, State, County and Borough governments.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING SUSPENSTION OF NEW JERSEY TRANSIT BUS ROUTE
SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITIES OF STONE HARBOR, AVALON, AND SEA ISLE CITY

WHEREAS, the County of Cape May has been informed that the NJ Transit plans to indefinitely suspend bus service to Stone Harbor, Avalon and Sea Isle City on its Routes 315 and 319 on or about April 7, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the suspension and/or termination of service to these communities would impact area residents and visitors that utilizes NJ Transit for both leisure and work-related trips; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Transit has citied difficulties with route detours and low ridership as the primary factors involved in their decision; and

WHEREAS, the route detour caused by construction on Townsend's Inlet Bridge is temporary; and

WHEREAS, the population of the County increases from approximately 97,000 in the winter months to over 700,000 in the summer months, resulting in the need for transportation alternatives; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Transit bus routes 315 and 319 provide the <u>only</u> fixed route service available to the general public to these three communities; and

WHEREAS, the County of Cape May, its 16 municipalities, and a wide variety of public and private agencies have repeatedly gone on the record with regard to the lack of adequate NJ Transit bus service to, from, and within the County of Cape May; and

WHEREAS, the cessation of service to three of our sixteen municipalities would create severe hardships to the residents, visitors and businesses of these communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Stone Harbor that the Borough Council does hereby oppose the decision of the NJ Transit to suspend service to the Borough of Stone Harbor, the Borough of Avalon and the City of Sea Isle City;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council requests that the NJ Transit be required to provide ample notice to municipalities, counties and the general public prior to the development of plans to suspend service to any municipality in its entirety so that the local units of government are given opportunity to provide input into the decision making process and to prepare for alterations in levels of service.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that NJ Transit is requested to formally meet with the County of Cape May and representatives of the impacted municipalities to discuss the matter and until such time as an amenable solution is found, to continue the current level of service on bus routes 315 and 319.

All properties North of 96th Street may water on Monday, Wednesday and Friday All properties South of 96th Street may water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday Watering shall be for no more than once daily, before 6 am or after 6 pm for no more that 30 minutes per zone.

Mayor reported a lot of these cases have come up before the Zoning Board and been approved. Planning Board felt that rather than people having to go to the expense of a hearing before the Zoning Board, that the Ordinances should be revised. It means in the Residential "C" Zone, it allows construction on a lawfully existing undersized lot without variance relief, provided the lot has 2,200 square feet or minimum lot frontage of 40 feet.

NATURAL RESOURCE MONITORING PROGRAM

Councilmember Rich stated that the Beachfront already has a program pretty much done on a regular basis, all the agencies in place. There is much information in the Borough concerning Dredging. It is in our Master Plan to have this kind of a program for dredging and it states the action plan is to be done by the Natural Resource Monitoring Program and by the Planning Board and the Council. She would like everyone to guide Natural Resources Committee in the first step. The Mayor and the Solicitor gave some background on the former dredging projects and the Solicitor suggested it would be a good start for him to come to a Natural Resources Meeting and start everything off with some background information.

6 Councilmembers AYE

Mayor Walters offered information on Site 103 and the efforts to off-load it and make it a reusable disposal site. The Borough received a \$350,000 grant from DOT and the Borough has been working on this for a number of years and had to get an extension of the lease from the Boat Owners Association since additional soil testing was required. What is on the table right now is possibly barging the material on Site 103 to Wildwood. They will be building a Solar Field on a former landfill so it has to be capped. They need more material than we actually have so they could take all of ours. Mayor Walters met this morning with Freeholder Morey and he has asked the Mayors in Cape May County to get together with the Freeholder Board, County Planners and Engineer to see if there is a County role in helping this along.

<u>COUNCILMEMBER KRAMAR – ROA POLL – MEETING TIMES</u>

Councilmember Kramar gave each Councilmember a poll from the ROA reference Council Meeting Options. Some people have asked about this, it was addressed a few years ago, but it has been brought forward again. Only 161 members responded to a poll but we will look at it Administration & Finance this week and readdress it again.

Mayor Walters announced that the Planning Board work session scheduled for April 9th will now be now April 16th at 4:30 pm. A proposal for professional planners will be reviewed.

Mayor Walters also announced two special Council meetings, Wednesday, April 18th at 6:30 pm in the Municipal Building and one on Saturday, April 28th at 10:00 am in the Stone Harbor School. These meetings will fully discuss three possible locations for the Stone Harbor Branch of the County Library, those locations being beachfront between 94th & 95th Street, Seng Place on 96th Street between First and Second Avenue and the second avenue lots between 93rd and 94th Street. Public Input will be solicited and there will be a presentation by Cape May County officials. No legal action will be taken.

<u>LIBRARY</u> Councilmember Carusi asked if there will be participation by the Council at these special meetings. Mayor Walters said that is why we advertised as a special Council meeting because most likely there will be comments from Council. Councilmember Carusi asked if the pros and cons from each site will be addressed for those attending, and how do we do that? How does it get out to the public, residents, second home owners, etc.

Administrator Gougher explained that the intent of the meetings is the County will present all the fact finding that they have done on each site, encourage the residents to ask questions about each site. We will then take their input over the two meetings and get all that information out to the residents. We can send a summary to everyone already on the distribution list, Scott can put something on the Web Site and do a press release, with all the information on all the sites and then ask people based on all the information presented, that we want them to tell us a site. We need their true opinion of where they feel the best site is. The committee will take that information and make a recommendation to full Council on one location. Administrator Gougher said the moderator will be the architect of record, their firm will handle being the vacillator at the meetings. They will take the existing drawing of the building, show it on the sites, indicate whether or not the existing building would have to be reduced on a certain site, too big according to set-backs, what would have to be eliminated, etc. All that information will have to be available in order for anyone to have any kind of educated opinion.

Councilmember Kramar said some concerns are that the building is too institutional looking. Is the County going to modify that or is the committee doing that? Administrator Gougher said the committee was not charged with the design of the building, just the location. However, any site other than the existing site, will need to be totally redone. Depending on what it is will determine the extent that they would have to redo the plans. At that time, if Council so desires, you can put your input in that. We will only be looking at location at this time. If the building doesn't fit on the locations, we will see that it doesn't fit.

Councilmember Kramar said so we are looking for input from the homeowners, taxpayers and the people that visit here at the meeting to tell us if they like that building. Administrator Gougher said no, it will be just location.

Councilmember Lane said if we are talking about these other locations and we know if we take the other locations, it has to be scaled down, aren't we doing harm to the selection process by trying to show them this huge institutional building on a smaller lot. Mayor Walters said that comes into the deliberations that you have, the pros and cons. Obviously, all the amenities we have in this building are not going to fit on a particular site. Are we willing to give up the museum, the meeting room, outdoor bathrooms? That is all part of the decision making process.

Councilmember Rich said if we pretended that we only had one location in the town, right now, for a county library, let's just say Seng Place and we went to the County and said this is where we want it and keep it a recreation area, keep the basketball court, keep a tennis court, keep a smaller playground, and a building is designed to be residential looking and favorable to that location. If we only had one location, we would be making it fit, now we have to stretch our imagination, each location has its' own personality and neighborhood, that is the hardest thing to do. The different locations can command a different look.

Councilmember Carusi said the library committee has established the process for procedure whereby we look at the sites. We started with 7 and 4 were eliminated. Councilmember Rich said that was correct. Councilmember Carusi asked don't you think those 4 should be make public so

if people were in favor of them, they will know why they were eliminated and how we got down to 3. Following that, the next thing that would have to happen during the meetings is the advantages and disadvantages of each of the sites has to get out to all residents for their feedback.

Councilmember Rich said the 7 are not a secret, they looked at Borough owned property. The Marina, the lots at 80th across from Public Works, 80th Street Recreation area, and the Parking lot at 123nd. It was narrowed down to 3.

Councilmember Carusi said he is not suggesting it was a secret but if our residents were in favor of one of those 4 they are entitled to know what they were and why they weren't accepted.

Councilmember Kramar said we are getting lots of input. Councilmember Carusi agreed but said it is not based on fact. Council agreed that people will get the facts at these meetings and then be able to make a decision. Administrator Gougher said all the information disclosed at these meetings will then go back out to everybody. And we will be saying, now please tell us again, what you opinion is.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Bob Ashman 10301 First Avenue, offered a suggestion about the library. He suggested Council make a list of what they want in the library before the public meetings. What you want will affect the size of the building. It is out towns' responsibility to tell the County what should go in the library as opposed to us accepting what the County says should go into a building. Once you have those you have a starting point on how big the building has to be. We are doing this backwards.

Councilmember Mastrangelo said the site selection will drive the facility. Mr. Ashman said the driver should be what should be in the library. Councilmember Mastrangelo agreed, said however, that is not where we are. Mayor Walters said we are not the experts in what belongs in a library, but we have told the County that aside from books and computers, we want to be the technical "hub" of Cape May County. We want the library to be the state of the art in Cape May County. We have already told them that. We have told them we want a meeting room, with state of the art audio in it, so we can have meetings, etc. Mr. Ashman suggested we widen the responses as proposed to the County system telling us, because if you measure library successes, the Cape May County library system is rated very poorly, there are two web sites that rate this with all the statistical facts. There are other places to go to determine what is "state of the art"

Councilmember Lane agreed and said besides programs and being more up to date with e-mail, we have to sit down with an expert and say these are the things and before they put a shovel in the ground, they have to agree with us of what they are going to give us and provide in the library.

Councilmember Rich said lets' pretend we bought a lot and it was 60 X 110 and we were going to build our home on it. Somehow we figure out what we want in that home on that piece of ground, it is a little reversed but that is how we are going to have to think about the other locations. It can be done, we have to think about what is important and what we really would use in this town year-round.
