#### **REPORTS OF COMMITTEES AND OFFICERS**

**PUBLIC SAFETY** – Councilmember Carusi reported that the Public Safety Committee met on December 7, 2012, in attendance was Councilmember Mastrangelo, Dunhour, and Administrator Jill Gougher. The Joint Court Administrator roll with Avalon is going well, The Committee is working on dispatcher shared services issues, the police administration building and reviewing State of Emergency procedures. Fire Chief Roger Stanford provided the following report for the Fire Bureau, month of November, 1,014 rental and business inspections, 35 life hazard inspections, 144 smoke detector inspections , 25 permits and 128 reinspections and 12 fire drills. The report for the Fire Department is 14 fire calls, total year to date is 192, the busiest year ever for calls. There were some gas leaks, electrical fires, smoke scares and alarms. There were 3 drills and 1 meeting, total man hours was 1,397 for the month, two mutual aid calls and 7 EMS. Chief Stanford congratulated Lt Chris Collette who just completed Fire Fighter II training course in Atlantic County Fire Academy , a three month course that he attended on his own. Police report - 3 letters received thanking the police department. Also motor vehicle stops for the month were 86, adult arrests 3, DWI 1, and many open door and windows. Senior call check ins were 5.

**NATURAL RESOURCES** - Councilmember Rich announced the committee met on December 7, 2012, Jill Gougher, Karen Lane, Al Carusi, Greg Sheeran and Grant Russ in attendance Site 103 continues to be a goal, to remove and use this material. Ocean Coastals have given results that the material is acceptable to use. We continue to work with DOT maritime division to plan our next steps. The goal for the beach is obviously to refill and repair and be ready for 2013. Replenishment that was planned for December will be combined with the Sandy Storm damage. As far as the bay goes, the goals are to repair our own dock damage and to continue to make the back bays as safe as possible, and to find a way to dredge our intercoastal waterways. We would like to ask the Army Corp of Engineers to come back and do a new profile of our back bays, the Point and the Inlet to show if there are any changes from this most recent storm. Bird Sanctuary Committee will be meeting in January, Natural Advisory

Resource Committee is being re-established for 2013, we are redefining the purpose and a new ordinance will be offered in January 2013. There may be a gathering of Bird Sanctuary Committee, Natural Resources, the Regular Natural Resource Committee and the Green Team, so we can get all these volunteers together to understand we are all here to help. Councilmember Rich stated that 2012 has been a learning experience for her, Natural Resources is an enormous responsibility and she still has so many questions and together we will move forward. Please keep the faith that we will protect and respect our Natural Resources for 2013, maintain our safe beaches and put a little more attention on the back bays, preservation of our Point and Bird Sanctuary.

Mayor Walters said she was at a meeting recently and they were talking about Office of Maritime Resources doing soundings in the bay to look for sunken boats and/or docks. We will be hearing more about that shortly.

BEACH & RECREATION - Councilmember Davies-Dunhour reported that the Recreation Advisory Committee met on Monday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> and the Beach, Rec and Tourism Committee met on December 14<sup>th</sup>. The Holiday Beach Tags are available in several stores in town and at Borough Hall. We have great news, just yesterday the Borough Engineer received an email from NJDEP confirming that a CAFRA permit is not required for the proposed placement of the concession stands with electrical connections on our beaches. The stands need to be seasonal and temporary remaining only May 1<sup>st</sup> to October 31<sup>st</sup> of each year. Also the electrical connections must be above ground utility lines only and must be removed in the off-season. We are very excited to get our concession stands back. There will be a motion tonight to authorize the Engineer to prepare the specifications. Thanks to Marc DeBlasio, we are thrilled. Friday December 7<sup>th</sup> the Recreation Department had hot chocolate, cookie decorating and an outdoor screening of the Polar Express at the Recreation building grades K-4. The December and January recreation schedules are available on the Borough's website under new items. In January we will add two new programs to the schedule, polities on Thursdays and story time on Wednesdays, both sponsored by the CMC Library. We met with Jerry Blackman from Olivieri, Shousky and Kiss architects and Dennis Straga of Straga Brothers on Friday Dec 14 to discuss outstanding issues concerning the recreation building, based on that meeting we are prepared to offer a final change order and Council will discuss that in closed session tonight. Playground on 81<sup>st</sup> Street, most of the equipment has arrived and because of Sandy the project slowed down. Game Time has contacted us to schedule a meeting. Tourism, Thanksgiving week-end was a success, good time had by all. Kudos to Liz Hargett and Jill Gougher for their work on the NJ Division of Travel and Tourism Cooperative marketing Grant. This money will be used for a distribution plan promoting Stone Harbor throughout the State. Liz Hargett reached out to Stockton College and now has an intern working with the Tourism Department, a Senior student studying Business Administration and is assisting with Data Entry. Changes to the Special Events application will be discussed tonight with full council. The update for the jitney service serving the Seven Mile Island in 2013 will be brought forward with an Ordinance in January that will include the route, cost, dates for service and will be in place by Memorial Day 2013. First big event for 2013 will be the Shiver on Saturday, March 9, 2013.

UTILITIES - Councilmember Lane reported Utilities committee met December 7, 2012, departmental issues were reviewed and discussed and some of the ordinances regarding construction and new water services must be updated . Water diversion report, another month and we used 102,000 more gallons in November than we did in November, 2011. We conserved all summer and now Sept, Oct and Nov we have been up significantly. Last month the matter of exempt properties was discussed and what we have discovered is that none of these exempt properties even see a bill. They are using a significant amount of water, and this will be corrected so that they will each see what they are using each month and how much the Borough is exempting. Letters were discussed from residents and problems were addressed, they will all be contacted. In the Go Green Committee, had a meeting with Katie Burnett of DEP on December 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Recreation Building. The program was excellent and Zack Nickerson of Americore volunteered to bring the program to school children. Once the children are back in the school we are going to visit and set up a program. In January we hope to present a new Ordinance that will require all new construction and all rehab work over 50% to install the "smart" controllers if they are going to be landscaping their property and using sprinklers. Thanks to Scott Wahl we had a press release in the Atlantic City Press on Friday. Library Report, Mrs. Rich, Mrs. Davies-Dunhour, Mrs. Gougher, and Terri Cwik from the museum and Mrs. Lane met to discuss the next step in building our library. Mrs. Cwik discussed what the museum felt they needed in space, we feel we have our vision

and mission statements shaped to where we want them and we have many of the necessary goals and objectives and we are now ready to move forward. Next month at the Reorganization meeting we will be presenting names of volunteers for the two committees. Mrs. Lane is looking for someone in the "older" age group that uses the Library for their input. Mrs. Lane and Mrs. Rich will be meeting with Deborah Poillon on Friday for a briefing of what we have done to date and to establish an ongoing dialog with representative of the County. Settlement on the building should occur on Thursday.

**PUBLIC WORKS** – Councilmember Kramar reported her committee met on December 12<sup>th</sup> with Jill Gougher, Karen Lane, Barry Mastrangelo, Greg Sheeran, Grant Russ, Craig Reeves and Jim Nicola. Discussion included beach replenishment, trap bags, lighting on the islands, crossovers being repaired, budget and urns. Charles Koch will be changing the music in the clock to fit with the season. Cleanup from Sandy is ongoing. Debris has been removed from the beach and trash is being picked up. Docks have been removed from the Marina and the bubbler system has been installed. Maintenance is ongoing on all Borough vehicles. Special events, Veterans Day, 13 hours, Christmas decorations, 169 hours, Christmas in Stone Harbor 129 hours and the Sandy Storm cleanup, just for November 1,468 hours. Winter trash schedule is in effect, trash and recycling picked up the same day. First clean up is March 11, 2013. There were 557 citizen contacts and work orders processed in November. Mrs. Kramar attended several meetings as Council President, including agenda, ROA, and all of Council attended the S2368 bill for leaders in Sea Isle City. Mrs. Kramar met to go over standing committees for next year and other pertinent subjects. The 9/11 meeting for December was cancelled because of the holiday and will meet in January.

ADMINISTRATIVE & FINANCE – Councilmember Mastrangelo reported the Administrative and Finance Committee met on November 28<sup>th</sup> and December 11<sup>th</sup> to discuss the budget. Overall we have spent 92 1/2% of our budget while in 2011 for the same time frame we spent 87% at the same time we have received 104% of the projected revenues, which in November of last year we received 97.5%. No major changes or issues with the budget at this time. We reviewed the 2013 request in preparation for the O&E discussions at little later in the meeting. On the December 11<sup>th</sup> meeting we met with Joe Meola to discuss our liability policy options for 2013. On for approval tonight is a resolution to apply the Borough's net distribution credits of \$13,853 as follows: \$5252 will be applied as a credit to our 2013 Jif premiums and \$8600 will be applied to our share of the JIF aggregate access loss contingency fund which can be used in upcoming years when the JIF anticipated increases in costs. The \$5252 being applied to our 2013 premium will allow us to upgrade our coverage at no additional cost. This will reduce our potential liability on claims currently our premium has a \$20,000 deductable and a \$250,000 co-insurance, with the credit we are able to eliminate the \$250,000 co-insurance. On December 6<sup>th</sup> Mr. Mastrangelo along with Jill Gougher, Judy Davies-Dunhour and Al Carusi attended a JIF training seminar which will give the Borough a credit of \$250.00 per person on our JIF premiums. The remainder of Council will attend the seminar in January to receive the same credit. On December 14<sup>th</sup> a number of council along with the Mayor attended a meeting at the County about FEMA and the new flood maps. The new maps came out Saturday and we are still trying to sift through them to see the total impact for the new flood elevations in Stone Harbor.

- Contractor is continuing work on First Avenue improvements.
- Contractor has completed the work at the recreation center and Golden Gate Drive.
- 96<sup>th</sup> Street pipework is ongoing.
- 98<sup>th</sup> Street infrastructure is complete, concrete work will begin next week and all work is proceeding on schedule.

#### **NJDEP Water Allocation Permit**

 We have completed the water allocation permit application forms and are coordinating signatures and permit fees. The NJDEP will not require the Borough to submit for permit renewal in addition to the application being filed.  Because of Hurricane sandy, NJDEP was delayed in providing the well search data we requested. The data is now received and is being input into the require GIS maps. With this delay we anticipate submitting the application with the completed hydrogeologic report by mid-January.

# USDA Rural Business Enterprise Grant (RBEG) Application

- The Borough was denied grant funding for planning and streetscape improvements.
- However, the application can be re-submitted to USDA for FY 2013.

# 95th Street Water Tank Improvements and Repainting

• The bid opening was held on December 13, 2012 and the apparent low bidder is Corrosion Control Corporation in the amount of \$484,200.00.

# 93<sup>rd</sup> Street and 107<sup>th</sup> Street Bulkhead Replacement

• The project design and permit forms are completed.

• We will be submitting the permit application to the NJDEP this week. **Police Building Expansion** 

- The site survey is complete and the geotechnical test is complete.
- Boring results are being analyzed and a foundation design is forthcoming.

# 95th Street Well Redevelopment

• We have transmitted the preliminary plans and specifications to the Borough for review.

#### **Beach Concession Stand**

• We have received a notification from the NJDEP that a CAFRA permit is not needed for the Borough's beach concession stands.

#### ADMINISTRATOR REPORT:

Administrator Gougher reported that tomorrow at 10 am there is a beach replenishment meeting in Avalon. She reported that she did speak to the vendor of the Trap Bag system and they will send information on a project they are just starting up North. There have been several meetings in the last month with the two open union contracts and both are moving forward. There are other meetings scheduled the second week in January. The jitney service, she will have the proposed Ordinance at the second meeting in January. The community energy aggregation program, we are hosting a meeting tomorrow at 2 pm and there are 3-4 towns that have expressed interest in joining with us, which is good. The next step will be to meet with the residents so we can explain what the program is all about. The CRS rating renewal which is for flood insurance, we are up for our 5 year cycle and there have been major changes in the rating system that would go into effect the middle of this year and the individual that works on our account will be here in two weeks in hopes that we can get everything done before the new regulations take effect, because it is anticipated that as people renew the requirements are a lot harder and towns could actually wind up losing pointes and the ratings could go down. So our goal is to try to get our rating up higher especially with the new flood maps coming out and the potential for people in new zones could see as much as 25% increase in their premiums. Ms. Gougher has reached out to Roger Stanford and Mike Koochembere to work with her to get the paperwork together so when she comes we are ready.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Stone Harbor hereinafter referred to as MUNICIPALITY, participated as a member municipality of the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund, hereinafter referred to as FUND, for one or more of the following FUND fiscal years beginning January 1, 1998, January 1, 1999, January 1, 2000, January 1, 2001, January 1, 2002, January 1, 2003, January 1, 2004, January 1, 2005, January 1, 2006, January 1, 2007 and

WHEREAS, the FUND is a statutory filed municipal joint insurance fund as defined in N.J.A.C. 11:15-2.1 et seq., and

**WHEREAS**, the MUNICIPALITY joined the FUND knowing that membership carries with it joint and several liability with all other member municipalities for each year of the MUNICIPALITY's membership, **and** 

**WHEREAS**, the MUNICIPALITY understands that the FUND's Executive Committee are the only persons authorized in law to make decisions as to when and how much of any available statutory surplus will be released by the FUND, **and** 

**WHEREAS**, the MUNICIPALITY understands that the FUND's Executive Committee are the only persons authorized in law to make decisions as to when and how much of any projected deficit will be declared as an additional assessment due to the FUND, **and** 

WHEREAS, the MUNICIPALITY understands that Available Statutory Surplus is defined to be the amount of money in excess of the projected value of claims by line of coverage, plus an actuarially determined value for Incurred But Not Reported claims, subject to the surplus reserve calculations as defined in N.J.A.C. 11:15-4.6 et seq., and subject to review and approval by the Department of Banking and Insurance and Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey, prior to release by the Executive Committee of the FUND, and

**WHEREAS**, the MUNICIPALITY understands that it remains jointly and severally liable into perpetuity despite the earlier release of Available Statutory Surplus due to the possibility that a FUND year wherein a return of Statutory Surplus has been duly authorized could later be presented with a claim for which it could be responsible causing a demand for an additional assessment from each participating member municipality of that FUND year, **and** 

WHEREAS, the MUNICIPALITY understands that it remains jointly and severally liable into perpetuity despite the earlier collection of an additional assessment due to the possibility that a FUND year wherein an additional assessment has been duly authorized could later be presented with a need for additional assessments from each participating member municipality of that FUND year, **and** 

**WHEREAS**, the MUNICIPALITY understands that its options for directing the distribution of its net share of released Statutory Surplus to be as follows:

- 1. Direct the FUND to apply the MUNICIPALITY's share to the MUNICIPALITY's premium in the next FUND fiscal year (N.J.A.C. 11:15-4.21(e)),
- 2. STRONGLY OPPOSING S-2368 REQUIRING SHORE TOWNS THAT ACCEPT FEDERAL BEACH REPLENISHMENT DOLLARS TO HAVE FREE BEACHES AND BATHROOMS

WHEREAS, federal beach renourishment projects throughout the country that include dune stabilization have proven over and over to prevent catastrophic loss in a major storm such as the recent storm Sandy; and

WHEREAS, the adequate storm protection provided by dunes and renourished beaches has far reaching savings for all taxpayers in the United States by way of significantly lowering FEMA claims and lower insurance costs for all taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, historically the beach tag revenue generated in Stone Harbor does not cover the expense of having clean safe beaches for our tourists, in fact the total expense to operate the beaches exceeds the revenue generated by beach tag sales which raised \$709,000 in 2012, therefore our municipal taxpayers not only fund the beach replenishment at a higher rate than other taxpayers in the State, but also subsidize the beach cleaning and lifeguards for the tourists who use the beach; and

WHEREAS, if towns such as Stone Harbor and other municipalities with beaches that do not have a beach utility are prohibited from charging nominal beach fees, these municipalities would be forced to fund with local property tax money, lifeguards, beach cleaning and public safety; and

WHEREAS, in towns such as Stone Harbor and others in Cape May, Atlantic, Ocean and Monmouth Counties, tourism is the number one industry; and

WHEREAS, in Cape May County, the tourism industry generates over \$5 billion annually, which means \$482 million in tourism-generated taxes that are sent to Trenton; and

WHEREAS, this bill will have an extremely negative effect on that South Jersey tourism that so richly contributes to the revenue of the State of New Jersey.

#### SPECIAL EVENT APPLICATION CHANGES

Councilmember Davies-Dunhour explained the packet in the agenda provided by Tourism Director Liz Hargett which shows the new application for special events. She stated that before the committee goes any further they wanted to get comments from the Council. It will require an Ordinance change. We would like to do the Ordinance change and then do the fees by Resolution. The basis of the application is a lot of the Borough employees are used for Special Events. Listed are Borough Sponsored Events and Non-Borough Sponsored Events. What is not listed is smaller events, book signings downtown etc. The committee is trying to recoup some of the money (expenses) that the taxpayers are putting out in supporting these events and they are looking for a happy medium, where we don't chase people away. We also increased the fees for filing, one fee for filing within 60 days, one fee within 30 days and 15 days is another. This will encourage people to get their applications in. The application asked many questions about what would be needed from the Borough.

Councilmember Lane commented that these are excellent suggestions, long overdue. She suggested since we now know what these things cost, perhaps we should look at a percentage from some of the bigger money makers. You may be able to exempt other smaller events.

There was a discussion about how to make it fair, without chasing people away from Stone Harbor.

Councilmember Kramar said the filing fee is a definite plus, will keep people from coming in late and give the Borough more time to prepare. It should be followed and there can't be any leeway.

Councilmember Davies-Dunhour said you can see we will be recouping only a small percentage of what we put out but we want people to come here, but it is starting to be at the expense of our taxpayers. If we are in agreement we will introduce the Ordinance in January make changes by Resolution.

#### AGENDA - ORGANIZATION MEETING

Mayor Walters said most other Municipalities do a consent agenda of some kind. The Clerk's office has prepared a draft agenda for the Organization meeting on January 2 and distributed it to Council. This will move the meeting along more quickly and still give the information to the public. Councilmember Davies-Dunhour asked if someone is in the audience and asks a question on a resolution that has been listed, how would that go? We will add a Public Session to the beginning of the meeting so people can ask any questions. Solicitor Donohue said from time to time a councilmember can pull out a resolution and move it down for the regular agenda and it would be voted on separately. Mayor told Council to look everything over and if they wanted something out or changed to let the Clerk's office know.

Councilmember Kramar had a question about the meeting times mostly the Reorganization meeting. An Ordinance change will be required to change the time of the Reorganization meeting.
